CELEBRATING OUR PAST PRESIDENTS EVOLUTION OF THE CENTER FOR MODERN AGING PRINCETON: REFLECTIONS ON THE PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE

As the Princeton Senior Resource Center (PSRC), now the Center for Modern Aging Programs (CMAP), marks a significant milestone, we reflect on the transformative journey of this vital community resource. Through the voices of those who have shaped its history, we gain insight into the accomplishments, challenges, and enduring hopes that continue to drive its mission forward.

Barbara Purnell: A Visionary Leader for Home Friends and Beyond Past President 1993-1995

Barbara Purnell's long-standing involvement with CMAP began in the late 1980s. She established the Home Friends program in 1989 and directed it for several years, providing vital support to homebound seniors. Purnell's leadership extended to the board, where she served as president and played a crucial role in overseeing the merger of PSRC with the borough senior center. Her vision for the future included the expansion of programs and services and the acquisition of the Suzanne Patterson building that would meet the organization's needs. Purnell's hopes have been realized with the acquisition of the Poor Farm Road facility, which has allowed for enhanced programs and services for older adults in the community. She continues to support the organization's mission through her involvement on the advisory board.

Billie Emmerich: A Legacy of Advocacy and Community Building Past President 2001-2004

Billie Emmerich's connection to CMAP dates back to the late 1970s, when her elderly parents needed assistance. She recalls her early conversations with Jocelyn Helm at Spruce Circle and her participation in "People and Stories," an intergenerational discussion group. Her advocacy for the merger of the Princeton Senior Resource Center at Spruce Circle with the Suzanne Patterson Center in 1994 laid the groundwork for a more unified organization serving Princeton seniors. As a board member, Emmerich and her husband authored a booklet on "Alternative Living Arrangements for Seniors," which was distributed by CMAP. Her tenure as board chair was marked by a strong sense of community and personal growth. Emmerich's positive feelings toward CMAP continue as she observes the organization's impressive professional staff, diverse programming, and unwavering commitment to the wellbeing of the community. As Billie shared "PSRC, now CMAP, was my home away from home during the early years of my retirement. I loved the feeling of community which the organization offered. I grew as a person who could offer leadership and be a constructive member." Her financial support reflects her gratitude for what CMAP has done for her and others and has confidence that CMAP will continue to make contributions to the well-being of people in the larger community.

Dave Saltzman: Pioneering Programs and Strengthening Unity Past President 2009-2011

Dave Saltzman's involvement with CMAP began in the late 1980s with the establishment of the Home Friends program in 1989, a significant achievement that provided companionship and support to homebound seniors. As board president, Saltzman oversaw the merger of the PSRC with the borough senior center, resolving existing frictions and fostering greater unity within the Princeton community. His hopes for the organization included the expansion of programs and services and the acquisition of a facility that would better meet the community's needs—a vision that has been realized with the facility on Poor Farm Road. Saltzman continues to serve on the advisory board, witnessing the enhancement of programs and services under solid leadership.

Norman Klath: A Steadfast Advocate for Expansion and Innovation Past President 2015-2017

Norman Klath's involvement with CMAP began in the early 2000s, when he and his wife participated in the fall flu shot and health fair, followed by Evergreen Forum courses. His dedication deepened over the years as he served in various leadership roles, including vice chair and later chair of the board. Reflecting on his contributions, Klath highlights the successful capital campaign that led to the acquisition and renovation of the 101 Poor Farm Road building as a key accomplishment. He also points to the transition to new leadership, the expansion of programs and services, and the increased community awareness and donor support as significant milestones. Looking to the future, Klath envisions further growth in CMAP's facilities and staff, continued emphasis on lifelong learning, and a sustained commitment to financial stability through a growing donor base and endowments.

Mike Kenny: Championing Leadership and Organizational Growth Past President 2015-2017

Mike Kenny's decade-long involvement with CMAP as a board member and president was marked by significant milestones, including the hiring of CEO Drew Dyson. Kenny credits their leadership with driving the organization's growth and success. He also highlights the successful fundraising efforts that enabled the construction of a new building and the expansion of programs to reach a broader audience in the Princeton community. Looking ahead, Kenny hopes to see continued organizational growth with innovative ideas and expanded funding to support CMAP's ongoing mission. He praises the organization's teamwork, high morale, and the impressive range of events and activities it offers.

A Shared Vision for the Future

As these reflections reveal, the evolution of PSRC into CMAP has been shaped by the dedication, vision, and hard work of its leaders and supporters. The organization's ability to adapt to changing needs, expand its reach, and maintain a strong sense of community is a testament to the enduring impact of those who have contributed to its success. Looking ahead, there is a shared hope for continued growth, innovation, and financial stability, ensuring that CMAP remains a vital resource for aging adults in the greater Princeton community for years to come.

Celebrating Joan Girgus: A Journey of Leadership Board Chair 2019-2025

Joan Girgus joined the CMAP community eight years ago as a board member. Nearing retirement from her work as a faculty member and administrator at Princeton University, Joan began to contemplate how she would spend her time. A chance encounter at a McCarter Theater event with Maggie Van Dagens, a PSRC board member, set the stage for her next chapter. "I sat next to Maggie at the event, and she asked me about my retirement plans. I was still figuring it out, so she asked if I was interested in aging. I mentioned that I had recently shifted my research focus in psychology from children and adolescents to older adults. She then asked if I'd be interested in joining the board. That was the start of my transition to retirement."

Reflecting on the recent changes within CMAP, Joan highlighted the organization's significant expansion, particularly the addition of a second site, which has led to an increase in programming and social services. "CMAP is much more visible in the Princeton community and beyond," she noted, attributing this to a broader range of program participants and collaborations with various organizations and corporations.

Under the leadership of CEO Drew Dyson, CMAP has expanded its geographical reach and embraced technology to enhance its connection with the community. The organization's ability to offer remote programming has been a game-changer, allowing CMAP to connect with individuals beyond the immediate area.

Joan identified several key accomplishments that occurred during her tenure that have shaped CMAP's trajectory:

- 1. Leadership and Vision: The hiring of Drew Dyson as CEO has brought a new level of strategic thinking to CMAP, encouraging the board and staff to consider broader growth and expansion.
- **2. Technology Integration:** Embedding technology into CMAP's operations has allowed for greater connectivity and accessibility, ensuring that programs reach a wider audience, both in-person and remotely.
- **3. Diverse and Strong Board:** Joan takes pride in the board's strength and diversity, which have been instrumental in extending CMAP's leadership and influence beyond Princeton. Joan's dedication to finding new board members who bring diverse skills, perspectives, and philanthropic commitment has been a key part of her legacy at CMAP.
- **4. Increased Visibility:** CMAP's increased visibility throughout the greater Princeton community has allowed new and old partnerships to flourish.

For Joan, CMAP has become a core part of her philanthropic efforts, embodying her values and contributing to her legacy. She speaks passionately about the culture of philanthropy that has been cultivated at CMAP, which supported a successful capital campaign and continues to fuel the expansion of programs and services. "It also allows for board leadership to be more of a partner in the success of our philanthropic growth," Joan added, underscoring the importance of board engagement in driving the organization's mission forward.

Joan is a forward-thinker who thrives on growth and innovation. Her hopes for CMAP's future are rooted in continued expansion – of programs, resources and services, diversity, participants, and geographic reach. "My greatest pleasure is doing new things," Joan admitted. "I like to start something new, turn it over to someone else to continue and grow, and then start something new again. I do this in my research and also in my work with CMAP."

Looking back, Joan reflects with joy on her time working closely with CEO Drew Dyson and the board, and she remains deeply committed to the continued success and growth of CMAP, even as she looks forward to the next chapter of her own journey.

CELEBRATING LEADERSHIP: THREE EXECUTIVES REFLECT ON THE EVOLUTION OF CMAP

The Center for Modern Aging Princeton (formerly PSRC) has long been a pillar of the community, providing essential services and support to aging adults in the greater Princeton area. Three key figures – Jocelyn Helm, Jan Marmor, and Susan Hoskins – have each played vital roles in the organization's growth and development. Their reflections offer a unique insight into the milestones achieved and the future hopes for the CMAP.

Jocelyn Helm: The Founding Vision (1974-1996)

Jocelyn Helm, the founding director of PSRC, led the organization from its inception until her retirement in 1996. She recalls the early days when the Princeton Borough Housing Authority generously provided their first working space at Spruce Circle. "There was a desk, bathroom, and player piano – all we needed to begin the first exercise classes," Helm reminisces. This initial support, coupled with "seed" money she earned from a gerontological presentation, laid the foundation for the center's success.

Helm takes pride in the relationships she fostered between Princeton University, local churches, merchants, state and county agencies, and local governments. These collaborations maximized the center's ability to serve seniors. Reflecting on her time, she says, "I truly enjoyed developing and designing activities and services aligned with the needs of the elderly."

Looking back on her tenure, Helm's greatest hope was for CMAP/PSRC to have a standalone facility – a dream that has been realized. "Based on my recent visit, I would say that my hopes and vision have been achieved, in fact, overachieved!" she remarks, expressing her excitement over the organization's growth.

Jan Marmor: Raising the Profile and National Accreditation (1996-2002)

Jan Marmor took the helm as executive director following Jocelyn Helm's retirement, serving from 1995 to 2002. During her tenure, Marmor led PSRC to national recognition by securing the first-ever National Accreditation for a senior center in New Jersey. This achievement, she notes, was an "eighteenmonth long process involving many Princeton players" and significantly raised the center's profile within the community.

Marmor also oversaw the initial design and concept of the Suzanne Patterson Center renovation, although she left Princeton before construction began. Another highlight of her time was the launch of the Evergreen Forum, a lifelong learning program that became a signature offering of PSRC. "I firmly believe that Evergreen Forum was a key piece in the trajectory that led to the Center for Modern Aging," she says.

As she reflects on her hopes for CMAP's future, Marmor is proud to see that the seeds planted during her tenure have flourished. "Those were the future hopes of our staff before and during my tenure, and they have come to fruition, culminating in where you are today," she concludes.

Susan Hoskins: Building a Robust Social Service Program (2002-2019)

Susan Hoskins served as executive director from 2002 to 2018, during which time she oversaw significant advancements at PSRC. Under her leadership, Princeton became the first community in New Jersey to be accredited as an Age-Friendly Community.

She also built a robust social service program and expanded the Evergreen Forum from four to twenty-five classes, with participation growing to 600.

Hoskins reflects on her tenure with a deep sense of accomplishment but also looks to the future with optimism. Her hopes include "deepening awareness of what today's 'younger seniors' are seeking–engagement, purpose, continued personal growth, and good health." She also envisions continued collaboration with area service providers and a stronger advocacy role on the state level. Hoskins has noticed some positive changes in CMAP's focus in recent years, bringing in CWW and OnStage, the nutrition program, continued growth of Evergreen Forum as well as strong support for the LGBTQ+ community. Susan remains encouraged by the organization's overall growth and the broadening of its community support.

Looking Ahead: A Bright Future for PSRC

The reflections of Helm, Marmor, and Hoskins highlight the remarkable evolution of the Princeton Senior Resource Center to becoming the Center for Modern Aging Princeton. From its humble beginnings to its current status as a nationally recognized institution, CMAP continues to thrive, driven by the dedication and vision of its leaders. As the center moves forward, it remains committed to serving the diverse needs of greater Mercer County's aging adults, ensuring a vibrant and supportive community for all.





What We Do

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
