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CMAP EXPANDS CAMPUS WITH ACQUISITION OF COMPANION BUILDING A

Princeton, NJ The Center for Modern Aging Princeton (CMAP) is pleased to announce the purchase of its companion property, Building A at 101 Poor Farm Road, further expanding its capacity to deliver innovative programs and services for older adults aged fifty-five and above and their families. The fully renovated building will open late 2026 as the Norman and Nancy Klath Center for Lifelong Learning, honoring longtime CMAP advocate Norm Klath and his late wife, Nancy.

The additional space will advance CMAP's mission to help older adults thrive through connection, purpose, and lifelong learning. The expanded Klath Center will enable CMAP to extend its award-winning programs in lifelong learning, social services, technology education, fine and performing arts, and community engagement for older adults, meeting the needs of its rapidly growing demographic.

“This acquisition represents a bold step forward in realizing our long-term vision of a comprehensive, multi-building campus for modern aging,” said Drew Dyson, chief executive officer of CMAP. “CMAP is a national leader in the movement to reimagine aging and with this additional space we can expand programming capacity, increase community access, and continue leading the effort to promote healthy, engaged aging while cementing the greater Princeton region as a true retirement destination.”

Norm Klath, whose leadership and support has been instrumental in CMAP’s growth, shared his deep personal connection to the project:

“Nancy and I always believed in CMAP’s extraordinary mission and its power to enrich the lives of older adults,” said Klath. “This organization does more than offer programs – it creates community, combats isolation, and gives people purpose at a time in life when that matters most. I am humbled that our names will be tied to a center dedicated to learning, connection, and dignity. It is a tribute to Nancy’s spirit and to the legacy we built together, and I am proud to support work that will benefit generations of older adults to come.”

In addition to the expanded Klath Center, CMAP is committed to maintain its critical presence in downtown Princeton – offering health and wellness classes, support groups, lifelong learning programs, as well as the Mercer County Nutrition Program out of the Suzanne Patterson Building at 45 Stockton Street.
